# Bradford safety boss praises FSOA stewarding initiative

The Safety Officer in charge at Bradford City has praised the Showsec-FSOA initiative to support lower league clubs with potentially challenging fixtures after benefiting from a team of stewarding staff for a clash with Barnsley.

The initiative swung into gear for the new season on 11th August 2018 for the West Yorkshire vs South Yorkshire 'derby'.

In recent seasons this match has taken place towards the end of the season when neither club could be promoted or relegated and around the anniversary of the Valley Parade fire. Barnsley fans have generally respected the occasion and supported fundraising efforts.

However, this season the match appeared on the schedules at the start of the season when valuable league points were at stake with the new campaign very much at the forefront of supporters' minds.

Bradford City's Safety Officer, Jonathan Heaton, was pleased to be able to take advantage of the initiative and our Platinum Partners, Showsec International, were able to provide a team including a Supervisor and SIA stewards to assist him on the day. Jonathan took over the reins at Valley Parade last September, so this is his first pre-season and full season at the helm. He said: "I met the Showsec team at 12 noon on the day of the event. I conducted a full stadium induction and went through my operational order with all staff to give them as much information as possible. To be fair all the staff did a fantastic job and slotted in well with the regular BCAFC staff. I never got a chance to say thank you and I really hope they enjoyed the experience of working at the Northern Commercials stadium."

The feeling was echoed by Showsec's Area Manager for the Leeds/Bradford Area, Sam Hodkin. He said: "The staff really enjoyed it and for me, it was a great opportunity to work with a club that I have tried to get involved with for some time. On this occasion, we provided response teams for the away end.

"As you know, we have a variety of skills and functions we can fulfil including search, response, segregation, hospitality and player protection. The benefits to FSOA members are that we are a national company that can draw on the experience of staff that regularly work at clubs such and Manchester City, Rotherham United, Blackburn Rovers, Burnley and Stoke City."

Asked if he would consider taking advantage of the initiative again should he be presented with a challenging fixture, Jonathan said: "Absolutely! For me it's a no brainer! There is nothing to lose and I would say to anyone offered this service "Go for it ". I'm so glad I did and would love to take advantage of this again in the future". He finished by sending both the FSOA and Showsec a massive "Thank you" for a successful operation.

The ever-increasing demand for SIAs has long been a topic of discussion between security companies, and indeed the FSOA. Staff retention at this level is often high on the agenda, especially as the numbers renewing their licences appear to be dwindling and are not getting replaced by younger stewards wishing to improve themselves. There are ongoing issues regarding the pay differentials as promoters seek to nail down expenditure and a number of SIAs have pointed to this as a key reason for not renewing their badges.

It is unlikely that the demand for additional security staff will reduce any time soon as promoters, local authorities and football clubs continue to search for ways to provide new events at their venues.

## CASE STUDY: Bradford City Vs. Barnsley

-With Bradford's Safety Officer, Jonathan Heaton

### How long before the match did you start your planning?

I actually started looking at the Barnsley Fixture pretty much as soon as the fixtures were released at the end of June. This match was highlighted as potentially one of our biggest home games of the season and with it being our first home game I wanted to ensure that every eventuality was covered.

#### Who did you consult in terms of intelligence and information gathering?

I spoke with our DFO some three weeks before the game as part of my due diligence and we had another meeting the week before to discuss our match day operation plans in greater detail. Steve Bailey, Barnsley's Safety Officer, was a massive help to me and we spoke a few times in the run up to the match.

### Did you do anything different in terms of planning for this match compared with others? If so, what?

No, not really other than starting the planning process much earlier.

#### How did your resourcing for this match differ from others?

It didn't too much as this fixture was categorised a CAT B which enabled me to supplement my segregation line with Police and reduce my stewarding numbers slightly. My overall numbers were very good on the day.

### What challenges were you expecting that were different from other matches?

The forecast for the away following was obviously a major factor, we anticipated an attendance of around 1,700 and actually sold the full allocation of 2,500 by mid-week. This was always going to be tricky and the fact Barnsley were in the Championship last season we didn't really know what to expect in terms of potential issues etc. Again, Steve Baileys input was a massive help to me. Bradford City have also gone through a massive personnel change introducing a brand new coaching team & signing 15 new players during the summer so the Bradford City supporters were always going to be out in good numbers to cheer on the lads.

### Did anything happen that you didn't expect? If so, please give details

Absolutely nothing. Pleased to say that everything went well considering it was our first home game of the season – Some of the stewards were a little rusty but for me we delivered a very good and safe operation.

### Would you do anything differently if you were planning this match again? If so, please give details.

No, nothing. I conducted my due diligence nice and early which for me was the key to running a safe event.

You were assisted in your resourcing by the FSOA. How do you think the Showsec team performed on the day? Did they meet your expectations? Please give details.

I met the Showsec team at 12 noon on the day of the event. I conducted a full stadium induction and went through my operational order with all staff to give them as much information as possible. To be fair, all the staff did a fantastic job and slotted in well with the regular BCAFC staff. I never got a chance to say thank you and I really hope they enjoyed the experience of working at the Northern Commercials stadium.

#### Would you seek this type of assistance again if a similar match occurred?

Absolutely, for me it's a no brainer! There is nothing to lose and I would say to anyone offered this service "Go for it". I'm so glad I did and would love to take advantage of this again in the future.

#### Anything else to add?

# Funding provided for Grimsby Town derby clash amid disorder fears

The month of August is notoriously busy for Crowd Management and Security companies as the music festival season is still in full swing at the same time as the new football season is getting under way. This creates an excessive demand for SIA-rated stewards across the whole spectrum and the nation's major providers, Showsec, G4S and Stadium TM all reported that their resources were at full stretch when demand peaked over the weekend of 18th August 2018.

Indeed, during August, we saw American artist, Kevin Hart, arrive in the UK for his "Irresponsible" Tour. Because the use of audio and visual recording equipment can seriously compromise the tour, Kevin has a strict "No mobile phone" policy at his shows and promoters were instructed to provide additional resources at their venues to remove individuals who failed to adhere to the policy. This meant that at some venues, security companies were parading more staff than at an outdoor festival with onsite camping!

This threw up a bit of a challenge for Nick Dale at Grimsby Town FC who was hosting a "derby" against Lincoln City on 18 August 2018. Previous post-match reports posted on the FSOA website suggested this might prove a tricky afternoon for Nick as there has been disorders at the fixture in the past.

Indeed, police had also been prepared for potential disorder and announced ahead of the game that they would be running a large operation with significant presence and 'spotters' monitoring Lincoln City fans as as nearly 2,000 away fans made the journey to Blundell Park. FSOA colleague, Pete Wallace at Scunthorpe United, was able to assist with additional stewarding resources and a local security company, Security 4 Europe Ltd, provided an additional team which the FSOA was happy to support with funding.

Nick said that Security 4 "sent experienced stewards that were instantly functional as search stewards and did a great job on the day". "As a result of the extra staffing we were able to have a completely incident free local derby against Lincoln," he added.


Nick was pleased to report that his fixture passed without incident and that additional resources he had at his disposal played a major role in making that possible. At this stage, Security 4 are not an official partner of the FSOA, but it was pleasing to see that the company could step into the breach for Nick at short notice and maybe in the future we might see them joining the Association.

Well done to both Nick and Pete for collaborating on this project and to Nick for delivering a positive outcome.

### Steward Training

The FSOA has been at the forefront of ensuring stewards are best trained to cope with their everchanging role for 26 years, and is continuing to do so by working with partner organisations to explore options around an alternative nationally-accepted stewards training package and accreditation process that is fit for 2018 and beyond. The FSOA proposes a new qualification that would streamline the initial training programme, make stewards undergo refresher courses every three years and allow Safety Officers to train, assess and qualify their own personnel. The FSOA will also lobby clubs to ensure stewards are paid appropriately for what they are asked to do.

# David Duckenfield pleads not guilty to Hillsborough manslaughter charges

David Duckenfield, who was in command of the 1989 FA Cup semi-final at Hillsborough stadium when 96 people were killed, has formally pleaded not guilty to manslaughter charges at Preston Crown Court.

The former South Yorkshire police chief superintendent made his plea by video link on September 10th.

Graham Mackrell, at the time the secretary and Safety Officer of Sheffield Wednesday – the owners and operators of the football ground – also entered a plea of not guilty to two criminal charges of breaching safety legislation.

This was the first time both defendants had formally entered a plea to the criminal charges since the judge, Sir Peter Openshaw, ruled in June that their prosecutions should go ahead.

Duckenfield is charged with manslaughter by gross negligence in relation to 95 of the people who died. No charge has been brought regarding the 96th victim, Tony Bland, who was 18 when he went to Hillsborough to support Liverpool at the match against Nottingham Forest.

Bland sustained severe brain damage due to loss of oxygen in the crush on the Leppings Lane terrace, and remained on life support in hospital for four years. The life support was turned off after a court application by his family, based on medical evidence that he would never recover from his vegetative state.

Duckenfield has not been charged in relation to Bland's death because a manslaughter charge in 1989 could not be applied if the victim died longer than a year and a day after the alleged criminal acts occurred.

The names of the 95 people with whose deaths he is charged were read out by the court clerk, Mark Nicholson, to Duckenfield during the hearing. A group of family members whose relatives were among those killed at Hillsborough were in the court's public seats. When Nicholson asked how he pleaded to the charges, Duckenfield replied "not guilty" in a clear voice.

The maximum sentence for manslaughter by gross negligence is life in prison.

Mackrell is accused of being culpable for Sheffield Wednesday's failure to agree with the police before the semi-final the arrangements and number of turnstiles for admitting Liverpool supporters into the Leppings Lane and north-west terraces, in contravention of the club's safety certificate for Hillsborough.

The second criminal charge accuses Mackrell of failing to take reasonable care for people's health and safety under the 1974 Health and Safety at Work Act.

He is alleged to have failed as the club's safety officer to take reasonable care in relation to arranging for sufficient numbers of turnstiles so "no unduly large crowds would be waiting for admission", and in drawing up contingency plans for coping with "exceptionally large numbers of people arriving at the ground", and to deal with situations where the available entrances "have proved insufficient to stop unduly large crowds from gathering outside".

The maximum sentence for the first charge is two years in prison; for the second, the maximum is an unlimited fine.

Three other men face criminal charges in relation to the disaster: Donald Denton, a former South Yorkshire police chief superintendent, Denton's then deputy, the former chief inspector Alan Foster, and the then South Yorkshire police solicitor, Peter Metcalf, are charged with doing acts with intent to pervert the course of justice.


The trials of Duckenfield and Mackrell are listed to start in Preston on 14 January.

### Safe standing review to look at crowd behaviour

A government review of safe standing at football grounds will look at whether crowds behave worse if allowed to stand than when they are seated.

The review will also examine research on the risk of injury to fans persistently standing in seated areas.

Sports minister Tracy Crouch announced the review in June, saying that it would look at the evidence and data around the issue.

All-seater stadiums are compulsory in English football's top two divisions.

Standing was outlawed in the top flight and Championship by the Football Spectators' Act in 1989. The legislation was brought into force following recommendations made in the Taylor Report into the Hillsborough

disaster, which claimed the lives of 96 Liverpool fans.

However, supporters have long campaigned to be allowed to stand at matches, citing improvements in safe standing technology.

Earlier this year 94% of the 33,000 respondents to an EFL survey said fans should be allowed to choose whether they want to stand or sit at games.

An online petition then prompted a Parliamentary debate on the issue, at which Crouch announced a wide-reaching review, stating that the Government doesn't "have data or evidence to make a decision either way on this".

The government's Department for Digital, Culture, Media and

Sport (DCMS) has now issued a tender

document setting out the terms of reference for the review.

The "impact of standing on disorder" is among the areas that will be examined, the document says, along with stadium and seating design and technology and approaches to crowd management.


The review is expected to be completed by the end of the year.

After a long-held opposition to any change in the law, the government is now taking action.

The DCMS-commissioned review will examine if safe standing is feasible for England's top two divisions.

A section of Celtic's ground was converted in 2016 and this will also be scrutinised.

Advances in stadium design and growing enthusiasm from supporters are both now clearly established - but the sports minister Tracey Crouch will want to be thoroughly convinced over the available evidence, primarily in relation to safety, that a policy change is justified before backing any reforms.





EA Sports have released the latest glimpse of the new Tottenham Stadium as it will appear on FIFA 19. Spurs were due to move into the new 62,062-seater stadium in time for the Premier League clash against Liverpool earlier this month. However, the £850million stadium project has been delayed until at least November following issues with the critical safety systems.

Spurs continue to work towards moving to their new home before Christmas, and have said it could yet be ready by the end of October. While the club wait to move in, fans can get a taste of what the new stadium will look like on FIFA 19 with the ground featured on the latest edition of the popular video games series.

Tottenham's new 62,000-seater stadium has been "future-proofed" for safe standing. The club have prepared the ground for a potential change in the law by creating "a purpose-designed 'safe seating' concept whereby safety and spectator comfort are given equal precedence, using the same moulded seats as in the rest

of the general admission areas". The club have planned for possible safe-standing in the new 17,500 capacity single-tier South Stand - which was the first to sell out amongst season-ticket holders - and in the away end where the club has "had issues with persistent standing" at White Hart Lane, according to reports.
